Summer, Time for Family Gatherings

Hopefully, this summer you will have several opportunities to connect or reconnect with relatives. Whether it be family reunions, family picnics, weddings...hopefully not funerals. Those gatherings offer great opportunities to further your genealogy research.

It's a good idea to bring a family tree chart, this gets people talking about their side of the family and many good stories and names can be gleaned from those conversations. Copies (not originals) of old photos are also a way to get people talking. This is where discussions about family resemblance occurs and is a great opener for stories. Be prepared to be asked for copies of your photos which is one way to get contact information.

Trivia questions get people interacting and learning about their ancestors, for example;

what was great great grandmother's middle name, when did the first ancestor immigrate and from where, who served in WWI or WW2, who had a tattoo and what was it, how many children did great grandfather have and what were their names, how many sets of twins were born in the



family...you get the idea. And don't forget to take group photos and videos to share. One great discussion I remember from a family reunion was about our parents jobs and wages, very enlightening.

DNA Ancestry Kits Have You Tried One?

Home DNA tests now claim to reveal your ancestry. There are several on the market. Are they reliable?

The TV show *Inside Edition* tested the results on identical sisters. A set of identical quadruplets and three sets of identical triplets took part in the investigation by submitting their DNA to a selection of companies.

A DNA testing expert told *Inside Edition* that "because these sets of identical sisters all came from the same fertilized egg, their ancestry should be absolutely identical," but surprisingly, not all of the results came back the same. Among the triplets were the Maynard sisters, who were once on "American Idol." They sent their swabs to a company called "Family Tree DNA." Their results showed British Isles ancestry ranged from 59 percent to 70 percent among the sisters. In addition, one triplet's results said she was 6 percent Scandinavian, while the other sisters were zero. For Western and Central European, one sister was 11 percent and the others were zero.

"Family Tree DNA" told *Inside Edition* that since the test they are improving their method of calculating the ancestry of their customers. They will be rerunning the entire database and post updated results, they said.

If you have tried one of the DNA kits? Let us know how satisfied you are with the results. We will publish the comments in the next newsletter.

Set on the banks of the St. Croix River, Hudson invites you to enjoy the amenities of a quaint river town, built on rich history, and is often thought of as the Western Gateway to Wisconsin. Among the fastest growing areas in the state, Hudson has managed to grow and develop while maintaining its historic charm and panoramic beauty. It is located just 27 miles from downtown Minneapolis.

Thursday Bus Tour Travels to Woodville and River Falls

On Thursday, September 14, the annual stevne bus tour will leave from the Hudson House on a motorcoach bus arriving in Woodville, Wisconsin, to have a Norwegian meal at 12:00 noon prepared by the Woodville Sons of Norway. In 2017 Woodville



celebrated their 66th annual Syttende Mai! The meal, to be served in Zion Lutheran Church, will include open-faced sandwiches, sausage wrapped in lefse, coleslaw, rommegrot, and Norwegian sweets for dessert. And of course, coffee! Cost is included in the tour price.

After the meal a presentation about Woodville's history will be given by Debby Walters, a retired middle school media specialist from Woodville. We will also be given information about the history of Woodville's Syttende Mai.

We will proceed a few blocks by bus to Woodville's Historical Society Museum. This museum houses hundreds of pieces of Woodville's history including the black bag from a doctor who emigrated from Norway, old Syttende Mai posters, costumes, and photos.

Following our Woodville visit we will travel to River Falls, Wisconsin, to Hope Lutheran Church. This church building is only a couple of years old, but many of the inside furnishings are from the Eidskog Church in Ortonville, Minnesota, that closed a few years ago. There we will learn some of the history of both congregations and have a chance to get a close look at the old altar, baptismal font, pews, and wall hangings. We will hold our memorial service honoring members who have died within the past year.

The bus will return to the Hudson House by 4:30.


What did Norwegian Immigrants Bring to the United States? Between 1825 and 1980, nearly one million Norwegians left for new lives in America. Consider the reasons for leaving, what they brought, and where they settled. Explore the immigrant experience through stories associated with artifacts in the Vesterheim collection.

Laurann Gilbertson holds a BA in Anthropology and an MS in Textiles & Clothing. She is the Chief Curator at Vesterheim Museum.

Norway in World War II Friday Sept 15 10:45 am John Yilek

John Yilek is "half Norwegian" and has traveled extensively in Norway. A retired Minneapolis-based lawyer, he teaches Norwegian History at the Mindekirken Norwegian Language and Culture Program in Minneapolis and at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at UM. He has also written two books *History of Norway* and *Stories of Norway*. His ancesters are from Røros and Nordland.

The stories about WWII tell of ordinary people and how they reacted to the war and the German occupation. "I tell those true stories and fact-based legends chronologically in the context of Norway's history," Yilek notes. "Most of the stories are preceded by an explanation of the related periods of history."

Norwegian Resistance to Nazi Occupation Dr John Haugo Friday Sept 15 4 pm

The Nazis invaded and occupied Norway from April of 1940 to May of 1945 during World War II. The most significant example of resistance was the so called "Heavy Water War". Telemark saboteurs raided the Vemork Hydro-Electric plant in Rjukan, Telemark where heavy water (deuterium) was produced. The Germans planned to use the heavy water to aid in their development of an atomic bomb.

Dr. John E. Haugo served on the Telelaget of America Board of Directors for twelve years, president for seven years. A native of Waubun, MN, he has a B.S. from Minnesota State University-Moorhead and an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota. Early in his career, he was a high school math teacher and football coach. He has served as CEO of the MN Educational Computing Corporation, Serving Software, Inc., and SearchAmerica Inc. John is currently serving on the Board of Directors of Norway House and on the Board of Trustees for Luther Seminary. He has received Distinguished Alumni Awards from the UM, from MSUM, and from the MN Athletic Administrators Association and this summer received the Outstanding Achievement Award from the UM.
